**NURSE CORPS LOAN REPAYMENT AND
SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS
FISCAL YEAR 2020**

Executive Summary

The Nurse Corps Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs Report to Congress for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 is in response to section 846(h) of the Public Health Service Act, which states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after the date of enactment of the Nurse Reinvestment Act, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

The goal of many Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) programs is to support the delivery of health care in areas of greatest need. HRSA administers the Nurse Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and the Nurse Corps Scholarship Program (SP) to improve the distribution of nursing graduates and professionals. The Nurse Corps LRP and SP support nursing education and training by providing recruitment and retention incentives to nurses committed to a career in underserved communities. These incentives include either a loan repayment or a scholarship award in exchange for service in a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses (Critical Shortage Facility or CSF) that is located in a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA). The Nurse Corps LRP also extends loan repayments to nurse faculty serving in accredited schools of nursing

In FY 2020, the Nurse Corps received \$88.6 million from annual appropriations. The Nurse Corps LRP received 5,988 new and continuation applications and the SP received 1,957 new and continuation applications. HRSA made 1,013 new and continuation Nurse Corps awards (756 total LRP, including 68 Nurse Faculty LRP, and 257 SP) to nurses and nursing students across a total of 48 states, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Puerto Rico. Of the 756 new and continuing Nurse Corps LRP awards, 688 were made to participants serving at CSFs. Ninety-seven percent of those awards were at CSFs in high-need HPSAs (high-need HPSAs are defined as areas with a score of 14 or higher). The average HPSA score for the FY 2020 CSF placements was approximately 17.¹ HRSA made 41 new and 27 continuation Nurse Corps LRP awards to nurse faculty participants—63 percent serving at schools of nursing with at least a 50 percent enrollment of students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Nearly 68 percent of SP awards were awarded to bachelor's degree students, 28 percent to master's degree students, 3 percent to associate's degree students, and 0.78 percent nursing diploma students.

As of September 30, 2020, the Nurse Corps field strength included 1,843 registered nurses and nurse faculty members fulfilling multi-year service commitments. Further, 84 percent of Nurse Corps alumni remained at a CSF for up to 2 years beyond the completion of their Nurse Corps service commitment.

¹ A HPSA is a geographic area, population group, or health care facility that has been designated by HRSA as having a shortage of health professionals. For the purpose of Nurse Corps programs, HRSA only uses geographic area and population group. HPSA scores range from 1 to 25 for primary care and mental health. The numerical score provided for a HPSA reflects the degree of need (i.e., the higher the score, the greater the need).

I. Statutory Language

Section 846(h) of the Public Health Service (PHS) Act requires that the Secretary provide a report to Congress. The PHS Act states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after the date of enactment of the Nurse Reinvestment Act, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

II. Introduction

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) administers the Nurse Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and Scholarship Program (SP) to improve the distribution of nursing graduates and professionals.

The Nurse Corps LRP is a financial incentive program in which registered nurses (RNs) and advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs), such as nurse practitioners (NPs), enter into a contract with the federal government to work full-time in a Critical Shortage Facility (CSF) with a critical shortage of nurses.² The LRP repays 60 percent of the outstanding principal and interest on the nursing education loans for participants with the greatest financial need in exchange for a 2-year service commitment. Participants may be eligible for an additional 25 percent repayment in exchange for an optional third year of full-time service.

The Nurse Corps LRP also makes awards to nurses to serve as faculty at accredited schools of nursing with a preference given where at least 50 percent of the students are from a disadvantaged background. The awards aid in the recruitment and retention of nurse faculty by decreasing economic barriers associated with pursuing a career in academia. Nurse faculty receive the same loan repayment benefits as program participants serving at a CSF. To become nurse faculty, an RN must continue training and assume additional financial and time commitments that many working nurses cannot afford.³ The average ages of doctoral- and master's degree-prepared nurse faculty are 57 years and 54 years, respectively.⁴ The shortage of nurse faculty is expected to increase as current nurse faculty retire.⁵

The Nurse Corps SP pays tuition, fees, and other reasonable costs and pays a monthly stipend to individuals attending accredited schools of nursing in exchange for a service commitment of at least 2 years in a CSF after graduation. The Nurse Corps SP reduces financial barriers to nursing

education for all levels of professional nursing students, increasing the pipeline of nurses who serve in CSFs. Qualified applicants who have the greatest financial need⁶ receive a funding preference. Tuition and fees are paid directly to the schools, while stipends are paid monthly to the students to assist with the cost of books, clinical supplies/instruments, and uniforms. Stipends were \$1,527.55 per month in fiscal year (FY) 2020. Each participant was eligible to receive \$18,330.60 in yearly stipend support.

The Nurse Corps LRP and SP work together to address the distribution of nurses across the United States through the placement of nurses in CSFs. Many factors affect the supply and demand of the nurse workforce including population growth, aging of the population and the nursing workforce, overall economic conditions, demand for health services broadly and within specific health care settings, and health care reimbursement.⁷ A 2017 study projected less growth in the RN supply relative to demand in seven states that could result in regional shortages by 2030.⁸ Employers in some parts of the country report difficulty in recruiting and retaining an adequate number of RNs because of an aging RN workforce and a lack of younger RNs to fill the positions.⁹ The differences in the age structure of the nursing workforce suggest that action to facilitate workforce development and projections for supply and demand of RNs differ by geographic region.¹⁰

III. Overview

HRSA establishes and publishes Nurse Corps program priorities annually in the Application and Program Guidance for each program. In FY 2020, 50 percent of the Nurse Corps LRP and SP funding was set aside to support NPs. Of the 50 percent allocated for NPs, up to 20 percent was available for psychiatric NPs and the remaining 30 percent was available to all other NPs. To increase the number of NPs participating in the programs, the Nurse Corps LRP and SP actively recruited licensed NPs and individuals interested in pursuing training as an NP through outreach efforts to colleges, universities, and associations.

Additionally, for the FY 2020 Nurse Corps LRP and SP application cycle, both programs also established set-aside funding up to \$750,000 respectively to support women's health for applicants working in one of the following capacities: women's health NP, certified nurse midwife, or certified obstetrics-gynecology (OB/GYN) RN.

For the Nurse Corps LRP, applicants with the greatest financial need and who work in Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) with scores of 14 or above receive funding preference.¹¹ For the Nurse Corps Faculty LRP, applicants teaching at schools where at least 50 percent of the student body are from a disadvantaged background receive funding preference.

The Nurse Corps SP considers applicants with the greatest financial need, based on the applicant's expected family contribution as determined by the U.S. Department of Education, to receive a funding preference. For FY 2020, this preference included an expected family contribution between \$0 and \$6,195. Among qualified applicants with the greatest financial need, HRSA makes awards based on consideration of:

- Enrollment or acceptance in an accredited diploma or undergraduate and graduate nursing program or an accredited graduate-level NP program, including NPs specializing in psychiatric-mental health, and full-time or part-time registration for consecutive terms.
- Enrollment or acceptance in an accredited Doctor of Nursing Practice program, a program for certified nurse midwives, certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNA), clinical nurse specialists, or psychology specialist, and full-time registration for consecutive terms.

This report summarizes the activities of the Nurse Corps LRP and SP for FY 2020, and provides information on:

- Number of enrollees, scholarships, loan repayments, and grant recipients;
- Number of graduates;
- Amount of scholarship and loan repayments made;
- Educational institution attended;
- Number and placement location of Nurse Corps LRP and SP recipients at CSFs;
- Default rate and actions required;
- Amount of outstanding default funds for both the Nurse Corps LRP and SP;
- Reason for default to the extent that it can be determined;
- Demographics of the individuals taking part in the Nurse Corps LRP and SP;
- Justification for the allocation of funds between Nurse Corps LRP and SP; and
- Evaluation of the costs and benefits of the programs.

IV. Report Requirements

Requirement #1: The Number of Enrollees, Scholarships, Loan Repayments, and Grant Recipients

In addition to awards made with annual appropriations, Nurse Corps made new and continuation Nurse Corps LRP and SP awards with funds recovered from awardees who breached their contracts. Section 846(g)(4) of the PHS Act authorizes that the amounts recovered from participants who breach their contracts to be available and remain available until expended. The

programs use the recovered funds to make new awards, continuations, and modifications to the existing contracts. If a Nurse Corps SP participant agrees to a contract for less than the full duration of the training program (e.g., a scholarship covering only the first 2 years of a 4-year bachelor degree program), the participant may request a continuation of the contract in return for a commitment for additional years of support. Nurse Corps LRP participants are eligible for an additional 25 percent of their original verified qualifying outstanding student loan debt in exchange for an additional year of service. Participants requesting continuations must be in good standing with the terms of the initial contract. The programs fund eligible continuations before new awards are made. In FY 2020, the Nurse Corps LRP added \$278,246.19 to its no-year account and the Nurse Corps SP added \$478,251.53. These funds provided six new awards for Nurse Corps LRP and four new Nurse Corps SP awards.

In FY 2020, HRSA made 756 Nurse Corps LRP awards, including 465 new awards, 291 continuation awards from annual appropriations, and 6 new awards from recovered funds (Table 1). Of the 756 awards, 264 awards (34.92 percent) were to RNs, 363 awards (48.02 percent) to NPs, 48 awards (6.35 percent) to CRNAs, 12 awards (1.59 percent) to certified nurse midwives, 1 award (0.13 percent) to a clinical nurse specialist, and 68 awards (8.99 percent) to nurse faculty.¹²

HRSA made 257 Nurse Corps SP awards, including 244 new and 13 continuation awards from annual appropriations. HRSA also made four new Nurse Corps SP awards with no-year funds (Table 2). Of those 257 awards, 8 awards (3.11 percent) were to associate’s degree students, 173 awards (67.32 percent) to bachelor’s degree students, 74 awards (28.79 percent) to master’s degree students, and 2 awards (0.78 percent) to nursing diploma students.

Requirement #2: The Number of Graduates

Nurse Corps SP participants may enroll in diploma programs as well as accredited associate’s, bachelor’s, and master’s degree programs. The minimum service requirement is 2 years, with a maximum of 4 years of full-time service, in a CSF depending on the number of years of academic support. Participants can choose from 1 to 4 years of scholarship support, consisting of payments for tuition and fees, other reasonable costs, and a monthly stipend.

Nurse Corps SP participants may work part-time to fulfill their service obligation. However, the service obligation years of service will be extended so that the aggregate amount of service performed is the full-time equivalent. Nurse Corps SP graduates have up to 9 months from the date of graduation to obtain a nursing license, accept an offer of employment from a program-approved facility, and begin full-time or part-time clinical services at a CSF. A total of 197 active Nurse Corps SP participants graduated in FY 2019. Of those participants, 179 were serving in a CSF and 18 were waiting for placement at a CSF.

Requirement #3: The Amount of Scholarship Payments and Loan Repayments Made

For amounts paid for Nurse Corps LRP and SP new awards and continuations, funded from annual appropriations (base funds) and no-year funds, see Table 3.

Requirement #4: The Educational Institutions Attended by Recipients¹³

Nurse Corps SP participants attended 226 schools in 41 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands (includes all Nurse Corps scholars awarded in prior fiscal years). Appendix B illustrates the distribution of FY 2020 new awards by state and educational institution at 155 schools in 36 states, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Requirement #5: The Number and Placement Location of the Scholarship and Loan Repayment Recipients at Healthcare Facilities with a Critical Shortage of Nurses

Non-nurse faculty Nurse Corps LRP and SP participants are required to serve at a CSF. The following types of facilities are eligible CSFs for placement of Nurse Corps LRP and SP participants:

- Critical access hospital
- Disproportionate share hospital
- Indian Health Service Hospital
- Private hospital
- Federally Qualified Health Center
- American Indian Health Facilities
- Native Hawaiian Health Center
- Rural health clinic
- Residential nursing home
- State or local health department
- Free and charitable clinic
- Ambulatory surgical center
- Home health agency
- Hospice program
- Urgent care center
- End Stage Renal Disease Dialysis Centers
- Private nonprofit hospital¹⁴
- Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic
- Community behavioral health center
- Nurse managed health clinic/center
- School-based clinic

In FY 2020, 424 new Nurse Corps LRP participants served in 336 CSFs in 42 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico (Appendix C); and 41 newly awarded participants served as nurse faculty in 40 schools of nursing in 21 states (Appendix D). In FY 2020, 165 Nurse Corps SP participants served in 151 CSFs in 37 states, and the District of Columbia (Appendix A).

Requirement #6: Default Rate and Actions Required

The Nurse Corps LRP and SP default rates¹⁵ are expressed as the percentage of participants in a cohort (all participants with a new or continuation contract awarded in a FY) who default (number of participants who have defaulted divided by the total number of individuals in the cohort). Individuals often participate for multiple years; however, HRSA calculates default rates in the FY in which an individual received the initial award. Therefore, for any given cohort, the default rate for a FY may change over time. When participants are out of compliance with their service obligation, they are referred to HRSA's Division of Participant Support and Compliance (DPSC) for compliance assistance. If the participant does not come into compliance and defaults, DPSC refers the participant to the Program Support Center for debt collection.

The maximum years a participant in full-time service may be in the Nurse Corps SP is 8 years—4 years in school and 4 years of obligated service. The maximum number of years that a participant in full-time service may be in the Nurse Corps LRP is 3 years—2 years of service under an initial contract and one additional year of service under a continuation. Participants with periods of approved suspension of service may require an additional 1 to 2 years of monitoring. Participants wishing to serve part-time must obtain prior approval from Nurse Corps and must extend the service obligation to equal the full-time commitment. Thus, default rates are reported over 10 years for the Nurse Corps SP and 5 years for the Nurse Corps LRP to provide an accurate picture of default rates. Historically, few to no defaults occur within the first year of the service obligation.

Participants who breach their contracts are placed in default and are liable to repay the Nurse Corps LRP or SP funds they received, plus interest, from the date of the default, which is the date the participant breached the Nurse Corps contract service obligation or, for scholars, the date they left their educational program as described in section 846(g)(1)(A) of the PHS Act. The total amount owed, including interest, must be paid within 3 years of the date of default. The interest rate is the maximum legal prevailing rate for the applicable quarter determined and fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury after taking into consideration private consumer rates of interest. The Nurse Corps LRP and SP work with participants placed in default by helping them to satisfy their debts through service when possible. In FY 2020, 11 participants who were previously in default were granted an opportunity to return to service. Of the 11 participants, 2 participants were from the Nurse Corps LRP and 9 participants were from the Nurse Corps SP.

As of September 30, 2020, there were 165 defaults in the Nurse Corps SP from FY 2011 to FY 2020.

Requirement #7: Amount of Outstanding Default Funds of Both the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Section 846(g)(4) of the PHS Act authorizes amounts recovered from participants who breach their Nurse Corps LRP or SP contract to be made available for the respective program until expended. HRSA uses these funds for new awards, continuations, and modifications to existing contracts. In FY 2020, the Nurse Corps LRP added \$278,246.19 to its no-year account providing six new awards, and closed the FY with a net no-year amount of \$7,543.21. In FY 2020, the Nurse Corps SP added \$478,251.53 to its no-year account providing four new awards, and closed the FY with a net amount of \$168,608.00.

As of September 30, 2020, the total outstanding default debt was \$3,173,690.02 for the Nurse Corps LRP and \$14,493,690.35 for the Nurse Corps SP.

Requirement #8: The Reasons for the Default

The most common reasons for default in the Nurse Corps SP are that participants fail to complete their service obligation, withdraw from school, or receive an academic dismissal.

Requirement #9: The Demographics of the Individuals Participating in the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Nurse Corps LRP and SP participants self-report demographic data. Of the participants who reported on sex, race, and ethnicity, the majority were female and White, with Black or African-American the largest minority group (Table 8). HRSA requests Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino ethnicity data in the electronic application separately from sex and race data. Applicants may choose to report on any of these demographic areas in whole or in part. As a result, Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino data may be over-reported as this information is the only metric for capturing ethnicity.

Requirement #10: Justification for the Allocation of Funds between the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Historically, total Nurse Corps funds have been allocated at 67-75 percent for the LRP and 25-33 percent for the SP. For FY 2020, \$88.6 million was appropriated for the Nurse Corps. Of the \$88.6 million, HRSA allocated \$77.4 million for the Nurse Corps LRP and SP, with the remaining \$11.2 million directly supporting the Nurse Corps programs in the form of staffing and acquisition contracts including the electronic system used to process program applications and monitor awarded participants, as well as tax withholding and reporting and other administrative obligations. Of the \$77.4 million, HRSA allocated over 67 percent (\$51 million) to the LRP and nearly 33 percent (\$26.4 million) to the SP. The combination of these programs allows flexibility in meeting future needs through the Nurse Corps SP pipeline of nurses and immediate needs through the Nurse Corps LRP, which places nurses in the field rapidly.

Requirement #11: An Evaluation of the Overall Costs and Benefits of the Programs

Analysis of costs per years of service:

1. FY 2020 Nurse Corps LRP Awards

In FY 2020, HRSA made 465 new awards, a decrease of 17 percent compared to the 561 new awards in FY 2019. This change is due to an increase in Nurse Corps SP awards in FY 2020. The average new award amount for Nurse Corps LRP participants was \$87,305.79 for non-faculty and \$93,854.43 for nurse faculty. This is a 12 percent increase in the average new award amount for non-faculty participants and a 32 percent increase in the average new award amount for nurse faculty participants from FY 2019 to 2020.

Nurse Corps LRP Continuations

In FY 2020, 58 percent of the participants initially awarded in FY 2018 requested a continuation award. The Nurse Corps LRP awarded 291 continuations in FY 2020. Nurse faculty received 9 percent (27 awards) of the continuation awards.

2. FY 2020 Nurse Corps SP Awards

In FY 2020, the Nurse Corps SP made 244 new awards and 13 continuation awards. The average new award was \$106,105.89—an 11 percent increase in the number of new awards and a 0.07 percent increase in the average new award amount from FY 2019 to FY 2020.

3. Average Amount Funded per Year of Service Obligated

Nurse Corps LRP new awards are based on 2 years of obligated service and capped at 60 percent of the applicant's total eligible loan amounts. The average new LRP award

amount per year of obligated service was \$43,652.89 for nurses serving in CSFs and \$46,927.22 for nurses serving in accredited schools of nursing—a 12 percent increase and a 32 percent increase respectively, from FY 2019 to FY 2020.¹⁷

Nurse Corps SP awards are based on 1 year of service for each year of funding with a minimum of 2 years of service. The average new SP award amount per year of obligated service was \$50,271.53—a 1 percent decrease from FY 2019 to FY 2020.

V. Conclusion

The Nurse Corps LRP and SP continue to work towards increasing the number of nurses working in CSFs and teaching in nursing schools across the United States. The Nurse Corps program will continue its focus on ensuring Nurse Corps participants are serving the nation. One of the critical activities of the Nurse Corps program in 2020 was to increase the number of advanced practice nurses trained in psychiatric mental health. The ongoing participation of nurse faculty in the LRP program will also help address upcoming nurse shortages in the future. Through the efforts and accomplishments highlighted in this report, dedicated RNs and APRNs can care for underserved populations in CSFs and provide quality education in schools of nursing with students from disadvantaged backgrounds.
