


# Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education

## LONG-TERM IMPACT

THCGME is meeting its aim to improve the distribution of primary care providers to underserved and rural communities. Since the program began in 2011, graduates routinely continue to work long-term in the areas they were trained. Among graduates who completed training:



**86%** Currently work in a medically underserved community



**15%** Currently work in a rural area
